The firm, opened in 2002, now employs 12, from master degree architects to interior designers and graphic designers. Shelden says the people are one reason for the firm's success.

Shelden says his firm is enjoying the resurgence of Wichita's downtown as well as projects in smaller college communities around Kansas.
